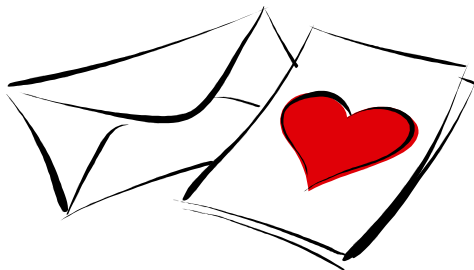

If cigarettes keep going up in price, I'm going to quit; 20 cents a pack is ridiculous.

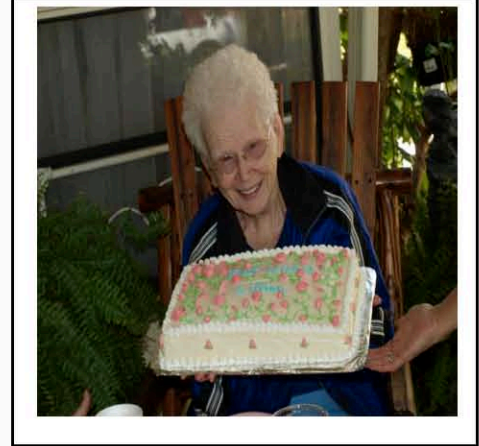
When I first started driving, who would have thought gas would someday cost 25 cents a gallon. Guess we'd be better off leaving the car in the garage.

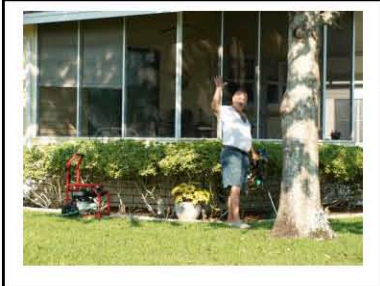
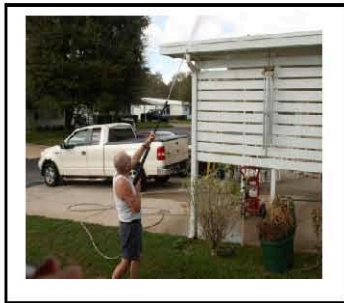
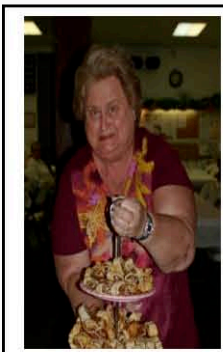
Pasta, breadsticks, salad. So good, one did not even miss the meatballs of the Lenten special.

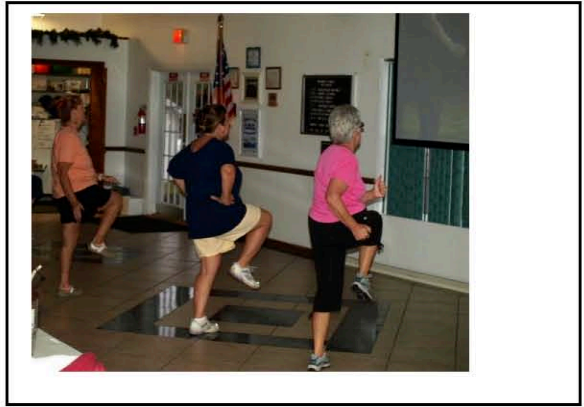

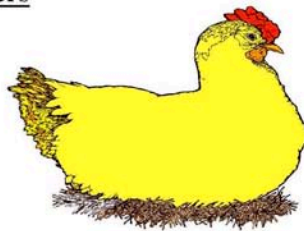
